

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I. VISION AND PROFILE

1. A CMI Institution

The unique stamp of St. Joseph's College, Moolamattom is that it is a CMI institution endeavouring to fulfil the great dream of St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara, the founder of the Congregation of the Carmelites of Mary Immaculate (CMI), in the backward district of Idukki. St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara was a prominent educationalist and social reformer of the 19th century. He was instrumental in starting a string of schools all over Kerala aimed at educating the backward and neglected classes of people. The Government of India honoured his services to humanity by releasing a postal stamp with his image in 1986. The CMI congregation is pledged to selfless service in the field of education, culture, health care and many other social activities. Wherever they are, they labour to create a better society and a better nation. St.Joseph's College, Moolamattom is a premier educational institution that comes under the St. Joseph's province of the CMI congregation. The heavenly patron of the college is St. Joseph, who is also the patron of the entire province. St. Joseph was the head of the Holy Family and a very devoted carpenter. The institution aims to project through him the qualities of a great leader and the need for devotion and skillfulness in whatever job one may be in.

2. CMI Education Policy

The education policy of the CMI congregation is enshrined in the CMI Education Policy Statement included in the handbook titled, *CMI Vision of Education*, released in 1991. The following is the text of the CMI Education Policy Statement.

We, the Carmelites of Mary Immaculate, after the example of our founder St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara, consider education the integral formation of the human person for the fulfilment of his/her individual and social responsibilities.

Our educational endeavours aim at forming leaders who are intellectually competent, spiritually mature, morally upright, psychologically integrated, physically healthy and socially acceptable; who will champion the cause of justice, love, truth and peace and who are ever open to further growth.

The secret of the success of our educational institutions is a community of teachers who are committed to their vocation, professionally competent, morally upright, just and humane in dealings and who grow in the true vision of education.

We aspire towards creating a just and humane society where dignity of the human person is respected, where unjust social structures are challenged, where our cultural heritage of ahimsa, religious harmony and national integration is upheld, and where the poor and the marginalised are specially taken care of.

We have to reach out to the families, primarily of the students, to assist them in their needs, to share their joys and sorrows, and to help them experience love and freedom so that the students realize that our educational institutions are an extension of their homes.

Our institutions are open to all students irrespective of caste and creed; they are accepted and cherished as they are;

and helped to grow in their cultural, social and religious traditions. As they are privileged to be in our institutions, they will also have the right to get acquainted with the Person of Jesus Christ and His gospel.

Being institutions established by and for a minority community based on religion; they will give preference to Christians in admissions and appointments and have a special concern for the faith formation of the Christian youth.

Our institutions hence to be open to society at large by making their resources available for the ongoing education and non-formal teaching.

For the realization of these CMI goals of education, we expect students, parents and teachers to share the vision and cooperate with us whole-heartedly.

3. Profile

St. Joseph's College Moolamattom had a very humble beginning. It was started as a junior college, affiliated to the University of Kerala in 1981 with just two arts batches for the pre-degree course. In the absence of a permanent building the classes were held in the parish hall of Arakulam Puthenpally . The institution owes an immense debt of gratitude to Rev. Frs. Melanius CMI and Colombiere CMI, the founding fathers of the institution and also to Fr. Clerus CMI, who in his capacity as the Education Councillor did a yeoman service in the initial stages of the institution. The institution can never forget the hospitality and generosity of Rev. Fr. Michael Kottaram, the Vicar of Arakulam Puthenpally who was gracious enough to let us use the parish hall as a makeshift college.

Rev. Dr. Thomas V. Kalarickal CMI was the first Principal of the college. Being a psychologist and a broadminded educationalist he felt the pulses of the new-born

institution keenly and helped it grow lavishing on it all the care and concern it required. It stands to his credit that he was able to shift the classes to the newly constructed building at Arakulam in June 1982. The institution remembers with gratitude the services of Rev. Fr. Abraham Perikilakkad CMI who designed the beautiful college building and Rev. Fr. Lazar Thannippara CMI who completed the construction of the building.

After two years of meritorious service as Principal Rev. Dr. Thomas V. Kalarickal CMI left the institution in March 1983 to become the Principal of St. Joseph's Training College, Mannanam. Rev. Fr. Aloysius CMI was appointed his successor in March 1983. He continued to be at the helm till 1990 for seven years. It was evidently a period of consistent growth for the institution and it emerged as one of the best colleges for pre-degree result under the Mahatma Gandhi University. Fr. Aloysius CMI will be remembered for his child—like innocence, honesty, cordiality and devotion to his work. He gave the needed prop to the institution during its infantile period and kept it from floundering and tottering.

Rev. Fr. K. C. Chandy CMI became the Principal of the college in 1990 and he continued in office till 1996 for a period of six years. In his tenure as the principal of the college he laboured much to make the college a prestigious institution. The college was upgraded with the starting of a graduation course in Chemistry in 1991. The B. A. degree course in Economics was started in 1993 and the B. B. M. degree course in 1995. Fr. K. C. Chandy was a man with immense engineering skill and the broad and beautiful flight of steps leading to the college bears testimony to it. Under his able stewardship were constructed the college library, auditorium, the various laboratories and the rest house for the girl students.

Rev. Dr. Emmanuel Jose Joseph CMI succeeded Rev. Fr. K. C. Chandy CMI as the Principal of the college in 1996. He served the institution as Principal for six years till his retirement in 2002. He was a man of vision and foresight and devoted himself to provide the institution with the infra structure it so far lacked. To inculcate a healthy sporting spirit among the students he constructed two beautiful stadia, one for volleyball and the other for basketball. A parking lot for teachers and a toilet building for boys were also constructed. A very sincere effort was made to spruce up the college campus with a garden. His crowning achievement was the main gate he constructed in front of the college which is acclaimed by all as an architectural marvel. In almost all his works Rev. Dr. Emmanuel Jose Joseph was ably assisted by the then bursar, Rev. Fr. Jacob Poriyath CMI. Academically also the college made deep strides during his tenure. B. Sc. Physics (V) Applied Electronics was started in 1998. The college was elevated to the stature of a senior college in 1999 with the starting of M. Sc. Chemistry. In 2001 B. A. English (V) Copy Editor was started. He also took the initial steps to secure the recognition of the UGC for the college.

Rev. Dr. C. J. Paul CMI took charge as the Principal of the College in April 2002 following the retirement of Rev. Dr. Emmanuel Jose Joseph CMI. His three years of service in the institution till his retirement in 2005 had been an eventful one, with the institution making a giant leap in all fronts. Being a committed academician and a meticulous planner and doer Rev. Dr. C. J. Paul CMI laboured incessantly to usher in a culture of quality and excellence to the institution. He modernized the Library making it user-friendly with the latest software, made the staff and students computer literate by setting up a Computer Centre and by providing the departments with computers, installed an EPBAX system and brought out a news letter called *The Throbbings* to ensure

the smooth flow of information in the campus and set up a Language Lab and Counselling Centre to develop the soft skills and self-esteem of the students. The Staff Quarters, Men's Hostel and the Canteen started in his tenure helped much the staff and students coming from afar. The academic front witnessed a breathtaking metamorphosis under the leadership of Rev. Dr. C.J. Paul CMI. The College was included under 2(f) and 12-B of the UGC Act and it paved the way for UGC aid for the College and faculty improvement programmes for the staff. The development of the Department of Chemistry into a Research Centre, the starting of Self-Financing Courses in M.A. Economics and B.Com., the introduction of UGC sponsored career oriented Add-on Courses, the starting of out-reach programmes and extension services to help the local community were all remarkable events associated with the the name of Rev. Dr. C. J.Paul CMI. However, the greatest and the most memorable achievement of Rev. Dr. C.J. Paul CMI was the NAAC accreditation of the college in 2005 with a B+(78 points) grade.

Rev. Fr. Thomas Maliyackal CMI took charge as the Principal of the college in June 2005 following the retirement of Rev. Dr. C.J. Paul CMI. Being a committed teacher and a veteran administrator he laboured to inculcate a spirit of work culture in the college. With a view to making the college academically more relevant and career oriented he introduced several coaching sessions with the aid of the UGC. A postgraduate course in M.S.W. was started in August 2005 in the self-financing stream. A college bus was secured to ease the mobility of the staff and students in the college. The Chemistry Research Laboratory was modernized to suit the needs of the research students. The Computer Lab was also refurnished with the latest networking system. The institution remembers him gratefully as a man destined to govern it at a very turbulent period of its history.

Rev. Dr. Gilson John CMI assumed office in June 2009. He had been a teacher of Economics in S.H College, Thevara and he carried with him the rich experience of a career trainer and educationalist. As a man with an accommodating and receptive mind, he considered it his mission to create a warm atmosphere of collegiality and camaraderie in the Institution. During his tenure, under the initiative of Dr. Joshy Varghese, Head of the Department of Malayalam, to commemorate the contributions of St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara, the Chavara Memorial Talk was instituted. Eminent orators from various walks of life are invited every year to keep alive the memories of this great educationist.

During his term of office, the college witnessed unprecedented development under the initiatives of Rev. Dr. Thomas George, the then Educational Counsellor and Rev. Fr. Bastin Mathew, the Bursar. As a testimony to the inventive effort of the Management, the college could materialize the long-cherished dream of providing a congenial atmosphere to relish good food, when the new canteen block was inaugurated in January 2012. Under the leadership of Rev. Dr. Gilson John CMI, the college underwent NAAC Reaccreditation in August 2012 and was awarded B grade with a grade point of 2.82. The inauguration of the Chavara Hall in February 2013 gave wings to the dreams of a miniauditorium for student activities and association programmes. Under his guidance, Rev. Fr. Bastin Mathew and Rev. Fr. Jenty Mukalel took efforts to bring new graduate and post graduate programmes to the college and it bore fruit with the sanctioning of M. Com and B.com with Taxation in 2013. M.A English and B.Sc. Mathematics in the aided stream were started in 2014 and BBA in self-financing stream was started in 2015, taking the college to greater heights in academic field.

Considering the need to provide additional space to the college, Rev. Fr. George Mattathil CMI, the Local

Manager and Rev. Dr. Thomas George CMI took initiative to append an additional block to the existing building and its foundation stone was laid on 22 February 2014. The new building named 'Chavara Block' was blessed and inaugurated on 10 July 2015.

The paradigm shifts to the ICT enabled teaching methodology with the wide use of the internet and the LCD systems were another innovative change initiated by Rev. Fr. Bastin Mathew CMI and Rev. Fr. Jenty Mukalel CMI. Rev. Dr. Gilson John instituted an Award in the College to promote research publication among the staff on the occasion of the Silver Jubilee of his Priestly Ordination. With a view to inspire fellow teachers in the matter of publishing books, he published 13 books. To encapsulate the meritorious service rendered by Rev. Dr. Gilson John CMI - he was an adept academician and a staunch spiritualist.

Dr. George V Thomas was appointed as Principal of the institution in June 2017 following the retirement of Rev. Dr. Gilson John CMI. It was during his tenure as Principal that the college went for its second Re-accreditation in 2018. It is a matter of great pride and honour that the college was able to gain A grade with 3.12 grade points in this reassessment. Dr. George V. Thomas was chosen as a NAAC Peer team member, later in the year. Dr. Saju M. Sbeastian took over as the Principal of the college following the retirement of Dr. George V. Thomas in March 2019 and is currently leading the College in the right tracks towards excellence.

Dr. Saju M. Sebastian succeeded Dr. George V. Thomas as the Principal of the Institution in April 2019. He performed commendable service to the Institution and society by initiating philanthropical endeavours in the flood hit areas in the district of Wayanadu whereby linking the college with the community. His inimitable support to the Students' Initiative

in Pain and Palliative Care unit of the college culminated in winning the best unit award in the district of Idukki in 2019. In his short stint at the helm as the Principal, he proved his worth as an expert athlete, an art enthusiast, an adept administrator, a patient listener, a visionary academician and above all a man of character. Josephine fraternity bid him farewell witha content heart. Dr. Ebey P. Koshy was appointed as the Principal of the college in April 2020 following the retirement of Dr. Saju M. Sebastian and is currently leading the college to further glorious heights.

Now the college provides for the study of *nine* UG courses viz, B.Sc. Chemistry, B.A. Economics, BBM, BBA, B.Sc. Physics (V) Applied Electronics, B.A. English (V) Copy Editor, B.Com. (V) Computer Applications, B.Com Taxation, B.Sc. Mathematics and four PG courses viz, M.Sc. Chemistry, MSW (Medical & Psychiatric Social Work, Child & Family Welfare), M.Com. & M.A. English. The college has also a Research Department in Chemistry. We have well equipped laboratories for the science courses, computer labs and a computerized Library. The college is well reputed for academic excellence and discipline. Our institution is blessed with a team of dedicated teachers who take great delight in moulding the future generation. The ambience the college provides, with the beautiful ranges of mountains all around, where rain and snow play hide and seek, where ravines and rivulets flow zig zag, is certainly conducive for study and all round development.

4. The Emblem

The Emblem of our College is a pictorial representation of its holistic vision which corresponds with the education policy of the Carmelites of Mary Immaculate (CMI), the first indigenous religious congregation founded by St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara, a prominent educationalist and social reformer

of the 19th century. The **lighted lamp** at the top of the emblem stands for the light of knowledge, the dissemination of which is the primary goal of the institution. The lighted lamp also reminds one of God's presence in our midst. At the top left hand corner of the emblem there is a depiction of certain laboratory equipments like the microscope and they highlight the scientific temper and the spirit of enquiry the institution wishes to foster in the students. The open book at the top right hand corner of the emblem bears a spiritual and temporal significance. On the spiritual level, the book with the letters Alpha and Omega stands for the Sacred Scripture and God, the be-all and end-all of life, and it articulates the message that the fear of God is the beginning of all wisdom. On the temporal level, the book stands for knowledge of all kinds which the institution endeavours to give to the students. The **helicopter** below the open book is a symbol of the institution's eternal commitment to the pursuit of knowledge in its effort to usher in a better kind of life to the people around. The **radiant circle** at the centre of the emblem stands for the resplendent sun full of light and life and it in turn represents the institution which is to function as a light and life giver to the people of the district. The words "Truth Liberates" engraved inside the circle neatly sum up the mission of the institution. It is our mission to liberate people by giving them the light of knowledge. At the bottom of the emblem is presented the terrain of Idukki where the institution is located. It stresses the fact that St. Joseph's College, Moolamattom is to serve as a light of knowledge in the district of Idukki.

5. College Motto 'Truth Liberates'

The college motto is taken from the Bible. Jesus tells the Jews, *You will know the truth and the truth will*

make you free. Jesus here highlights the fact that the only way to ultimate freedom is ultimate truth. The Hindu prays, Asathoma Sath Gamaya. Buddha exhorts, Hold to the truth within yourselves as to the only lamp. The Quran proclaims that God is truth. To Gandhiji, the Father of the Nation, all his life was an experiment with truth. Truth is always associated with knowledge.

It is knowledge that dispels the darkness of ignorance and fills the heart of man with the light of truth. The institution is committed to the liberation of the taught by providing them with the truth of knowledge. True knowledge sought in a spirit of enquiry matures the mind and liberates the soul. Ultimate truth is ultimate reality and those who devote themselves to it become free within and without.

6. Management

The college is managed by the St. Joseph's Province, Kottayam of the CMI Congregation. The Provincial is the Manager of the college and the Prior of the St. Joseph's Monastery at Arakulam is the Local Manager. The general management of the college is vested in the Governing Body whose ex-officio president is the Manager. Other members are appointed by the Manager in accordance with the byelaw of the Governing Body.

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IV. RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Discipline

- 1. The Principal is the ultimate disciplinary authority in the college.
- 2. Every one should stand at attention at the sound of the prayer bell and continue to remain so till the prayer song ends, wherever he/she be in the college campus.
- 3. Stand up as the teacher enters and leaves the class. Greet him/ her as he/she enters the class and thank him/ her as he/she leaves it.
- 4. Students should not enter or leave a class in session without the teacher's permission.
- 5. During free hours the students are expected to make use of the library, Computer Lab or go to the retiring room. No one should be found loitering in the veranda during free hours disturbing the classes in progress.
- 6. In words and deeds students are expected to be most decorous. They should always bear in mind that character formation is the ultimate aim of university education.
- 7. Every student shall handle the college property with care. Vandalism and destruction of college property will be severely dealt with and material loss will be fully recovered with fine.
- 8. Election on the basis of politics is forbidden as per the court order and political activity in the campus is disallowed. Students resorting to strike are strictly warned not to enter any class room. No demonstrations, dharnas and strikes are permissible inside the campus.
- 9. Students are not allowed to address the college authrorities in a body as such action is subversive.
- 10. Students are expected to keep the premises of the college tidy, clean and healthy.

- 11. Every student shall be properly dressed and hair dressed. Students shall not wear shabby or showy clothes.
- 12. Smoking, consumption of alcoholic beverages and the use of narcotic drugs are strictly prohibited.
- 13. The back veranda of the college is meant exclusively for the girls. Boys are not expected to use it.
- 14. Any student whose presence in the college is found detrimental to the general well being of the institution shall be removed from the college permanently or temporarily depending upon the gravity of the case.
- 15. Students should carry at all times college identity card which should be shown to the authorities when demanded.
- 16. No formal meeting or celebration classwise or otherwise can be arranged without the presence of a teacher.
- 17. No closed-door function or celebration is allowed in the absence of teachers.
- 18. The use of cell phone is strictly forbidden inside the campus.
- 19. No type of fund raising by the students should be permitted, as these practices lead to extortion and misuse of funds.
- 20. Bike race / Motor car race/ Elephant procession or similar activities shall not be permitted inside the campus.
- 21. No type of vehicles shall be used during celebrations inside the College campus.
- 22. All celebrations in the campus will be under the supervision of the principal or the staff designated by the principal.
- 23. Students will be allowed to bring their vehicles only up to the designated parking area. Entry beyond that point is strictly prohibited.
- 24. The use of two wheeler for 1st year students and four wheeler for all students are strictly restricted inside the campus.

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- 25. Students availing public bus service are to maintain queue system while boarding the bus.
- 26. The Principal reserves the right to refuse admission to any applicant for any course without explicating any reason, if he/ she feels that admission of that person is detrimental to the interest and discipline of the college.
- 27. In the interest of the institutions and for the sake of discipline, the principal is entitled to take any punitive action on any student for his/her misconduct.
- 28. Misconduct shall include:
 - * Not attending clasess without sufficient reason
 - * Disrespectful behaviour towards the staff
 - * Provoking students to strike and participating in strike in the college.
 - * Loitering in the Verandas during free hours and creating disturbance to the classes in progress.
 - * Organizing tours without the permission of the principal.
 - * Blocking gates/doors or passages which would restrict the mobility of staff and students in the college.
 - * Involvement in manhandling or harassing fellow students.
 - * Disturbing the programmes and functions in the auditorium by shouting, howling or dancing.
 - * Resorting to any kind of malpractice in the examinations.
 - * Scribling offensive, abusive or obscene words or figures on black boards or any kind of writing on the walls or other places in the college or in the college campus.
- 29 Students have to occupy their seats by the second bell at the commencement of morning and afternoon sessions. The teachers will be present in the class before the third bell. Observance of strict silence during morning prayer is compulsory.

- 30. Every student must wear their uniform on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.
- 31. Every student has to wear their Identity Card when they are in the college campus.
- 32. There shall be a Class Council for every class comprising HOD, Tutor, Parent and Student representatives. The Council is responsible for monitoring and regulating the general discipline in the class concerned. The decision of the HOD is final in any matter of dispute.

2. Mahatma Gandhi University Students' Code of Conduct - Rules 2005 - Extracts

i. Prohibition on Political Activity inside the Campus

- (a) No student of a college shall get involved in any political activity by himself or abet the said activity to be carried on by fellow students inside the campus in any manner whatsoever and any such activity is hereby banned inside the campus
- (b) Taking part in any political activity by organising students or to cause gatherings inside the college campus for the purpose of doing any activities as defined in Rule 4 (6) shall constitute serious indisipline. Every member of such a gathering shall be individually liable and responsible for the gross indiscipline in this regard and Principal shall have the power to take disciplinary action against students who indulge in the aforesaid activities.
- (c) It shall constitute gross indiscipline to call for and appeal to strike based on policies and ideologies that may be preached by the political parties or their sister organisations or students wings. The participants in the strike aforesaid shall be dealt with by the disciplinary authority and they shall be imposed appropriate punishment as provided in these rules.

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- (d) No student of a college shall stage or indulge in any activity like Dharna, Gherao, obstructing entry to and from any class room, office, hall or other places inside the campus and such activities shall be treated as misconduct.
- (e) No student shall shout slogans inside the class rooms, office or any other place inside the campus and obstruct and interfere or cause disturbance and nuisance to the ordinary functioning of the institution.

These activities shall be treated as misconduct.

ii. Procedure for Imposition of Punishment

- (a) The Principal of the college shall be the disciplinary authority in respect of the students in the college.
- (b) If, it comes to the notice of the Principal that a student or a class of students have committed misconduct as referred to in Rule 1 above and that the Principal is satisfied that there is prima facie enough material in the allegation against the delinquent student, he shall immediately pass an order suspending student/students from the college.
- (c) If the Principal is satisfied that the delinquency alleged in the complaint requires further investigation inquiry, he shall report the matter to the College Council. After reporting the matter and after seeking the views of the Council referred to above the Principal shall appoint a competent teacher/teachers to inquire into the matter and to submit the report immediately.
- (d) The Inquiry Officer so appointed shall conduct inquiry without delay after gathering oral or written evidence from the complainant as well as person against whom the allegations/delinquency were made. The Inquiry Officer also shall give fair and responsible opportunity to all the parties and shall submit a report to the Principal without unnecessary delay. After the receipt of the report, the Principal shall consider the report and take appropriate

action, which he deems fit including the imposition of the following punishments.

- Imposition of fine
- 2. Issuance of compulsory transfer certificate
- 3. Dismissal from the college.

In the event of imposition of dismissal or compulsory issuance of transfer certificate, the Principal shall forward the order along with the report to the University.

iii. Prohibition of Damage to Property

The student shall not disfigure the classrooms, compound walls, or other buildings, inside the college campus by pasting posters or writing on the walls in connection with any activity. They shall not damage or destroy any furniture, equipments and other materials inside the college campus. In the event of any student indulging in any such activities, a fine shall be imposed on him, to be fixed by the Principal of the college after evaluating the extent and magnitude of the damages so caused. The aforesaid imposition of fine is without prejudice to the liability of the delinquent student for prosecution under the provisions of the Indian Penal Code or under the provisions of Prevention of Damage to Public Properties Act. The damage so fixed by the Principal shall be recovered as arrears of land revenue and in the event of non-payment, the recovery proceedings shall be taken against the person responsible.

4. Admission Rules

- 1. Admission to open Merit and SC/ST quota are done through CAP as per the direction from the University.
- Admission to community and management quota, Sports quota, special reservation for the physically challenged and the differently abled are done at the college level. Application form for these seats can be obtained from the college office.
- 3. The Principal reserves to himself the right to reject admission to any student without reasons.

- 4. 50% of the seats in each Programme, will be filled in on the basis of merit. 20% of the seats are reserved for SC/ ST candidates (SC 15%, ST 5%). 20% of the seats belong to the Management quota and the remaining 10% will be reserved for Syrian Catholic students on the basis of merit.
- 5. One seat for each degree course is reserved for candidates with at least District level sports records. One percent of the general merit seats is reserved for the physically handicapped in the degree courses. In the P. G. courses one seat for every 20 will be allotted to the sports quota.
- 6. Qualifying certificates and mark lists once deposited will not be returned except when the students leave the college. Hence they are advised to keep sufficient number of attested copies of these documents.

5. Attendance and leave of absence

- A working day is divided into two sessions, the morning session of three periods and the afternoon session of two periods.
- 2. The morning session begins with a prayer.
- 3. Attendance will be marked at the beginning of each period by the teacher engaging the class.
- 4. Late comers are not eligible for attendance.
- 5. Students shall not be absent from any class without the consent of the teacher concerned.
- 6. A student requiring leave only for a period may be granted such leave by the teacher concerned and for a session by the class teacher. If leave is required for more than one session the student has to obtain a written permission from the Principal in the prescribed form. (The model of the leave application form is given at the end). Application for

leave sanctioned by the Class Teacher and Principal should be submitted to the office.

- 7. A student who is absent even for a single period will lose the attendance of that whole session.
- 8. The names of students who absent themselves from the college for more than 15 consecutive working days without satisfactory explanation will be removed from the rolls. They may be re-admitted on payment of the re-admission fee.
- 9. Attendance in religious and moral instruction classes is compulsory for all students.
- 10. Students having a minimum of 75% average attendance for all the courses only can register for the examination.
- 11. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of 2 times during the whole period of the programme may be granted by the University on valid grounds. This condonation shall not be counted for internal assessment. However, it should be remembered that condonation is not the right of the student. The Principal may consider the application for condonation only on receipt of satisfactory report from the conerned class teacher and HoD.
- 12. Benefit of attendance may be granted to students attending University/College union/Co-curricular activities by treating them as present for the days of absence, on production of participation/attendance certificates, within one week, from competent authorities and endorsed by the Head of the institution. This is limited to a maximum of 10 days per semester and this benefit shall be considered for internal assessment also.
- 13. Those students who are not eligible even with condonation of shortage of attendance shall repeat the semester along with the next batch after obtaining readmission.

6. Payment of Fees

- 1. Tuition fee will be collected in eight equal instalments, in the month of June, August, September, October, November, December, January and February respectively. The first instalment of fees including the special fees will be collected from the students of the senior classes within a period of seven consecutive working days beginning with the date of reopening of the college. For junior classes the special fees and caution deposit will be collected on the date of admission.
- 2. Subsequent instalment will be collected from the students before the 7th consecutive working day of the month concerned. The principal will fix the due date for collection of fees for each instalment for various classes within the seven consecutive working days.
- 3. If any student fails to pay the fees or special fees on the date he/she shall be liable to pay a fine of Rs. 5 along with the fees on or before the 10th day after the due date. If the 10th day happens to be a holiday, the next working day will be counted as the 10thday.
- 4. If the fee with the fine of Rs. 5/- is not paid on or before the last date fixed for the fine of Rs. 5/- an additional fine of Rs.5 will have to be paid. If the fees and the fine of an instalment are not paid before the last opportunity given for payment of that instalment the name of the student will be removed from the rolls of the college with effect from the date following the expiry of this period and the student will not get the benefit of the attendance from the date of removal from the rolls of the college. If the student is to be re-admitted he/she has to remit all the arrears of fees with fine. The re-admitted students will get the benefit of attendance only from the date of re- admission. The last

- opportunity for payment of an instalment of fees is defined as the last working day previous to the due date of succeeding instalment.
- 5. The name of defaulters of an instalment will be published on the notice board after the expiry of the last opportunity fixed for payment.
- Every student is liable to pay the prescribed fee for the whole term during any part which his/her name is on the rolls of college.
- 7. Refund of fees once remitted will not be granted.
- 8. Students belonging to SC and ST who are bonafide subjects of Kerala State are eligible for full fee concession and stipend. They will have to produce a certificate of nativity and community from a revenue officer not below the rank of a Thahasildar.

7. College Library

- The members of the staff and students of the College are entitled to make use of the College library and reading room.
- 2. The library and reading room will function from 9.00 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. on all working days. On holidays other than Sundays and public holidays, the library and reading room remain open from 10.00 am to 4.00 p.m.
- 3. Strict silence should be observed in and around the library. Students are allowed to take only a note book into the library hall. Other printed materials, bags, laptops, umbrellas etc., should be kept at the entrance.
- 4. Students should produce their identity cards if demanded by the library staff.
- 5. Students may take periodicals from the shelf after entering their names in the Periodicals Issue Register. The

periodicals must be put back in the same place after reading. Periodicals will be lent for one day after 15 days of their arrival.

- 6. The maximum period of loan for books is fixed for 14 days. Students may also take books for reference to be used within the library. Those who fail to return books after 14 days will have to pay a fine of Rs 1.00 per day. If a book is not returned within a month that book will be considered lost.
- 7. Only two books at a time will be issued to the degree students. The P. G. students may take three books at a time. Issue will be made to them only on the basis of the availability of the books. Students are not allowed to take books from the shelves without the permission of the library staff. They shall not handle books carelessly or put them in a haphazard manner.
- 8. The members of the staff may keep books (maximum ten) only for fourteen days. Books returned after this period shall incur a fine of Rs. 1.00 per day. Books shall not be lent through messenger but can be returned through them.
- 9. No person shall tear out, write upon or make any mark in any book or article belonging to the library. A book, if damaged or lost by a member he/she has to pay a fine at the rate of three times the cost of the books.
- 10. Before leaving the counter the members should examine the book borrowed and report to the library staff any damage found therein. If they fail to do so, they will be held responsible for any damage detected afterwards.
- 11. The librarian has the right to call for submission of any book at any time.
- 12. Students shall not exchange their library cards and books borrowed from the library. All the students must return their library cards by the end of their course.

- 13. Since the library is partially automated, members shall have the facility to e-search for the books and other details.
- 14. Library attendance will be recorded through biometric system.
- 15. Students who lost Library Card should pay a fine whenever they apply for their certificates from the office.

8. Issue of Certificates

- 1. A student who has paid all dues to the college is entitled to a Transfer Certificate (T. C.). At the end of an academic year, if progress and conduct have been satisfactory, a conduct certificate may be issued.
- 2. A student, past or present, desiring to obtain a certificate (Transfer, Course, Conduct, Age, Marks of Identification etc.) shall apply to the Principal in writing stating the year of study and the class number.
- 3. Every such application shall be submitted along with a search fee of Rs.10/- for students on the rolls and Rs.20/- for others. For all such payments a receipt shall be obtained from the accountant.
- 4. In case a student is expelled from the college for serious misconduct or repeated misbehaviour, his/her T. C. will be sent to the Registrar of the University and the matter will be reported to his / her parent or guardian.
- 5. Every student should collect his/her T. C. at the end of his/her course and produce it when admitted to the next course. T. C. will be issued only against the surrender of identity card.
- Conduct Certificate is a document which a student has to earn. It is not issued as a matter of right. Conduct Certificate is issued on the basis of an over all evaluation by the teachers concerned.

9. Class Teachers

Education is a process that involves enriching the intellect and fine tuning the emotions of the students. This is best achieved with the help of teachers who can act as guides and counsellors to those under their care. Keeping this idea in mind class teachers are assigned for each class and they ensure personal care, attention, guidance, counselling, evaluation and assessment of each student in the class entrusted to their over all supervision and direction.

A. General Instructions

- Every teacher in the Department is expected to cooperate his/her utmost in the activities of the various associations and those undertaken by the Department.
- 2. Every teacher is personally responsible for the discipline of the students. Leave letter should be collected from the absentees and they should be kept in the file meant for it. No student should be allowed to leave the campus after coming into the college without the prior sanction of the class teacher/HOD. The students should not be allowed to collect any money from any student without the sanction of the class teacher or the HOD. Tours and such common programmes should be arranged only under the leadership of the class teacher with the prior sanction of the Principal and the HOD.
- 3. The HOD and the teachers in the Department may bear in mind that the Principal is ultimately responsible for every thing that happens in the institution. So it is very necessary to inform him of everything that happens in the Department and cooperate with him wholeheartedly for the smooth running of the institution.

10. Termly Exams and Internal Evaluation

The performance of every student is subject to a periodical assessment by the teachers concerned in addition to the conventional external examination. The marks awarded to the students in the internal assessment will be forwarded to the University for inclusion in the final mark sheet.

- 1. There will be two Internal Examinations in a semester.
- 2. A progress report will be given to the guardian giving details of the progress in studies, classes attended and the remarks of the Principal.
- 3. Students are not allowed to absent themselves from exams, test papers, compositions and internal assessment.
- 4. It shall be the duty of each teacher to keep a neat record of the internal tests and assignments of the papers he/she is incharge of, in the register provided for the purpose. The internal assessment register shall be made available for inspection as and when demanded by the Principal or the HOD.
- 5. The valued scripts should be given back to the students within a week after the conduct of the tests/assignments and the marks should be entered in the register provided.
- 6. Common internal exams will be held in the months of July and August for the semesters I, III & V and in the months of January and February for the Semesters II, IV & VI. In addition to the above, weekly testpapers are conducted on a regular basis to improve the result.
- 7. No student shall be allowed to complete the programme by attending more than 12 continuous semesters.
- 8. For all courses without practical*

11. Grievance Redressal Mechanism

A Grievance Redressal Mechanism operates in the college in order to settle the grievances of the students. It is a three tier system which functions in the following way.

Tier 1	- Class Teacher
Tier 2	- Head of the Department
Tier 3	- Principal/Principal in consultation with the
	College Council.

Any matter of complaint / act of indiscipline of student, shall be first submitted to the class teacher concerned and if the complaint is denied of justice he/ she shall approach the HOD. If justice is denied there also, the matter is settled by the Principal.

12. Excursion and Study Tours

Excursion and study tours by students are permitted as part of the curricular and co-curricular programme, under the following stipulations.

- Only final year students are allowed to organise study tour/ excursions.
- This should be done only with the prior permission of the class teacher, Head of the Department concerned and the Principal and should obtain the prior approval of the Dy. DCE well in advance.
- 3. Booking of vehicles and arrangements for stay while on tour should be made only after consultation with the authorities concerned.
- Class teacher and other teachers deputed by the respective Head of the Department or Principal should accompany the students.
- 5. The maximum number of days for a tour shall be three.
- 6. Any act of indiscipline including misconduct, smoking, consumption of alcoholic beverages, the use of narcotic drugs and eve teasing while on tour shall be considered an act of indiscipline committed in the campus and will result in punitive action.
- 7. Every participant should produce the permission letter from their Parents/Guardian five days before the tour.

V. ASSOCIATIONS AND SERVICES

1. Campus Ministry, C. S. M., & Prayer Group Campus Ministry aims at the spiritual and moral development of the staff and students in the college. It chiefly renders the following services:-

- Arranges Devotion to the Sacred Heart, Holy Mass for the Catholic students and Talks for the Non-Catholic students every first Friday.
- b) Holds Annual Retreat and Value Education Talks
- c) A Staff Orientation Programme is arranged to motivate the staff about their great mission.
- d) Runs a unit of the Catholic Students Movement (C.S.M) to inculcate spiritual and moral values in the students.
- e) Regular Prayer Services and Bible Classes are arranged for the students. In the month of October, Catholic students are encouraged to recite the rosary.
- f) The staff and students are encourged to help financially the destitutes in the neighbourhood.

2. Internal Quality Assurance Cell

An IQAC functions effectively in the College to help the Principal enhance and sustain a culture of quality and excellence in the institution.

3. Parent - Teacher Association

The Parent - Teacher Association gives the guardians of the students an opportunity for participating in the planning and implementation of all matters pertaining to the physical, mental and moral welfare of the students. It also provides a common forum for the parents, teachers and management to discuss matters of importance related to the institution.

4. National Service Scheme (NSS)

The NSS is part of the Youth Welfare programme of the Ministry of Education, Govt. of India. The main objectives of this co-curricular programme is to train the students in community service. The selected students are given special training to engage themselves in constructive social action. They work with, for, and among village people. The NSS works in liaison with local welfare agencies in mitigating

the social problems. Those who successfully complete the training under the scheme will be awarded certificates and are eligible for grace marks for higher studies.

5. National Cadet Corps (NCC)

The National Cadet Corps is a National Training Programme aimed at preparing the students for a military career. It endeavours to instil into the minds of the young a spirit of patriotism, sacrifice, discipline and selflessness. A wing of the NCC has started functioning in the college from 2008.

6. Staff Co-operative Society

A Co- operative Staff Credit Society is functioning in the college for the welfare of the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college. All the permanent members of the teaching and non-teaching staff are eligible for membership in the society. The society provides facilities for deposit and loans of various kinds.

7. College Canteen

A College Canteen is run on contract basis within the campus. The Management monitors its functioning and ensures the quality of its service. Students are not permitted to bring food from outside to the canteen. Students are not allowed to engage in academic activites in the canteen.

8. Medical Inspection Wing

All the students on the rolls of the college are medically inspected by a Medical Officer on dates fixed by the Principal.

9. Career Planning Cell

The Career Planning Cell endeavours to equip the students with the skills demanded of them by the job market. The Cell arranges classes on personality development and career planning. The cell also makes available to the

students books on general knowledge and journals giving information about job opportunities.

10. Women's Cell

The Women Cell provides a forum to the girl students to come together and discuss their problems. Seminars on topics pertaining to women are arranged periodically. Various competitions are held exclusively for girl students to make them aware of their talents and build in them the much required self-esteem and confidence.

11. Counselling Centre

The Counselling Centre aims at helping the students in growing up spiritually and emotionally. It provides a congenial atmosphere to the students to let off their steam and regain their equipoise.

12. Sahithya Vedhi

Sahithya Vedhi is a cultural forum aimed at developing the artistic and literary talents in the students. It arranges a series of talks related to art and literature for the benefit of the students. Sahithya Vedhi also arranges various competitions like the production of manuscript magazine.

13. Department Associations

An association functions under each department in the college and it caters to the all round development of the students that come under it. Department heads are the directors of the various associations.

14. CLUBS

a. Tourism Club

The Tourism Club arranges various programmes to highlight the importance and relevance of tourism. Visits to places of natural beauty and historic importance keep the

members always happy and vibrant.

b. Entrepreneurship Development Club

Formation of Entrepreneurship Development Clubs is a novel programme launched by the Industries and Commerce Department of Kerala State in co-operation with Kerala Institute of Entrepreneurship Development. Some of the chief objectives of this club are:

- (i) To inculcate social virtues i.e., trustworthiness, integrity, hard work, discipline, honesty etc. as constituents of entrepreneurship.
- (ii) To sensitize students on the real economic and industrial development of the state.
- (iii) To make them aware of the unlimited developmental potential of the state and to inculcate entrepreneurial culture in the students. The ED Club aims at nurturing the entrepreneurial talents of its members.

c. Legal Literacy Cell

The Legal Literacy Cell provides the students with a forum to discuss legal matters and to acquaint themselves with the common laws of the land and the rights, privileges and immunities each citizen is entitled to.

d. Student Service Cell

A Student Service Cell functions in our college in association with the Student Services of the M.G. University. It arranges talks and seminars of general nature for the welfare of the students.

e. Youth Parliament Forum

The Youth Parliament gives training to students in the customs and conventions of parliamentary democracy and enables them to participate in the district and state level

Model Parliament competitions.

f. Oratory and Debating Club

The Oratory Club endeavours to give special training to those students who are interested in developing their rhetorical skills.

g. Quiz Club

The Quiz Club arranges various quiz competitions and trains students to represent the college in the various district and university level competitions.

h. Tagore Forum

The Tagore Forum functions under the Department of English to foster the literary and histrionic talents of the students. Periodical meetings of the members are arranged and each one is encouraged to engage in any kind of events conducive to bolster his/her self confidence.

i. CARE

CARE stands for Community Amelioration and Regeneration Endeavours. It is under the leadership of CARE the college plans and carries out its various extension activities.

j. CASE

CASE is the extension and consultancy wing of the Department of Chemistry and it lends advice in the setting of Science Laboratories. It conducts various chemical analyses like soil analysis and arranges programmes aimed at generating interest in Chemistry.

k. Bus Travellers' Grievance Redressal Cell

The Cell looks into issues between the bus operators and the students of the college and aims to solve their problems in an amicable manner.

15. SC/ST and Minority Monitoring Cell

The College provides special coaching to SC/ST and Minority Students with the generous financial assistance of the UGC. The programme envisages a two-pronged training programme - **Remedial Coaching and Coaching for Entry in Services** - aimed at ensuring social equity and socio-economic mobility of these under privileged sections of the society.

The Remedial Coaching Scheme aims at improving the academic skills and linguistic proficiency of the students in various subjects by raising their level of comprehension of such subjects. The Coaching for Entry in Services endeavours to equip the SC/ST and minority students with the skills required to perform well in the various competitive examinations conducted by the UPSC, PSC, banks and other public and private undertakings. Classes are arranged for GK, Reasoning, Mathematics, English, computer typing, shorthand, secretarial courses including computer based programmes.

16. Service Entry Coaching Cell

College provides special coaching for Post - graduate students in qualifying National Eligibility Test for Lectureship/ JRF. In addition to that, the Cell offers coaching classes and guidance for the UG and PG students in various competitive exams including PSC and UPSC.
