6.9 What efforts are made by the University/ Autonomous College for Examination Reforms?

Grades and Grade points are given on a 7-point Scale based on the percentage of total marks. A separate minimum of 30% marks each for internal and external (for both theory and practical) and aggregate minimum of 40% are required for a pass for a course. Candidates having a grade E or above will be eligible for higher studies. The earlier pattern of internal and external examinations was given up and a new pattern was introduced whereby students were to submit only one assignment and had to attempt only one internal exam in a semester. Assignments are to be given from 1 to 4 semesters, a seminar in the 5 semester and Viva voce in the 6 semester. Decided to conduct the practical examinations only at the end of even semesters.
